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The Need

Speech, language, social and cognitive development of children who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing is likely to be impaired by their hearing loss. However, access to hearing aids and intervention services improve outcomes dramatically. Children who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing can learn to hear, speak and learn at a commensurate rate with their hearing peers when provided with appropriate intervention.

The Facts

Utah spear-headed universal newborn hearing screenings by mandating screenings in 1998. However, children identified early do not have access to hearing devices and habilitation services through insurance in order to complete the next vital steps in early intervention.

Approximately 50,000 babies are born in Utah every year. 100 of those babies will be diagnosed with a significant permanent hearing loss. About 40% of those children are covered by Medicaid.

The Concern

Under Utah code 31A-22-610, insurance Currently, the state funds the companies are required to include Children's Hearing Aid Program coverage for care and treatments of which only provides a single pair of medically diagnosed congenital defects. Childhood hearing loss is a congenital defect in most cases. Insurance companies are currently not covering treatments.

The Cost

A pair of hearing aids can cost up to Providing hearing aids to children \$6,000 and must be replaced every 3-5 years. Since hearing loss can be hereditary, some families have multiple children with hearing loss needs. Many families cannot afford to provide the necessary habilitative treatments.

with hearing loss will reduce the costs borne by the state, including an estimated \$420,000 in special education, and much more in social welfare programs. Lifetime cost estimates of insufficiently treated hearing loss can total approximately \$1 Million.



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
